DiCaprio helped by Canadian documentary

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■ ROLE RESEARCH Award-winning film about mercenaries in modern warfare shown to actor for his role in Blood Diamond

eonardo DiCaprio got a little from his friends in Canada in the making of Blood Diamond. Who knew?

A locally made documentary called Shadow Company tackles the controversial subject of mercenaries in modern warfare. Neither obviously left nor right, it was codirected by Nick Bicanic and Jason Bourque.

Bicanic got the idea to do the film after a classmate from Cambridge, England — a law graduate, no less - announced he was going overseas to become a mercenary. What followed were colourful and detailed e-mails to Bicanic from his friend on the ground in Iraq.

Bicanic sent an early cut of the film to Edward Zwick, director of Blood Diamond. Zwick replied in an e-mail from Mozambique, saying how much he loved the film and wanted to show it to DiCaprio for research on his character, an ex mercenary.

A few months later, Bicanic travelled to meet DiCaprio on set in Mozambique. He and actress Dominika Wolski spent two days there and wound up at a birthday party for Djimon Hounsou, who plays fisherman Solomon Vandy in Blood Diamond.

Bicanic and Bourque were also invited by Senator Edward Kennedy to a rare bi-partisan showing of Shadow Company on Capital Hill.

The little documentary that could has just received some muchdeserved recognition. It netted four Leos at the weekend's ceremony in the documentary category, includ-

ing best film, best film editing, best directing and best writing. Kudos to Shadow Company.

Guess who was spotted outside Al's Pizza in Gastown recently? Penelope Cruz and Sir Ben Kingsley, who are in town shooting Elegy, which is based on the Philip Roth novel.

It is the story of cultural critic David Kepesh (Kingsley) who finds his life thrown into tragic disarray by Consuela Castello (Cruz), a wellmanned student who awakens a sense of sexual possessiveness in her teacher.

Tuesday night, the filmmakers were putting up a New York Citystyle sign reading 77th Street on St. Paul's Hospital Comox Street entrance for a shooting there. New York City in the West End? Anything is possible.

The lovely and talented Marcia Cross, who plays Bree Van De Kamp in the monster hit Desperate Housewives, was among an array of celebrities who showed up Tuesday night for a splashy party celebrat-ing the opening of Holt Renfrew's new store in downtown Vancouver. 

And on and on and on.

"It has been a great, great experience," said Sponagle.

Insight Film Studios is set to start shooting two new movies of the week. In the first, called Empty Arms, Laura Leighton Savant plays a classical music critic who becomes pregnant after an uncharacteristic

one-night stand with a country music star, played by Antonio Cupo.

Her quest to find the perfect family to adopt their baby turns into a journey of self-discovery and love for both of them. It is expected to air this fall on Global in Canada and on Lifetime in the U.S.

In the second, Ratko, Ratko Volvic (Efren Ramirez) is the privileged son of a wealthy Eastern European dictator who enrols for the freshman semester at an American university where his exotic accent and hedonistic ways soon establish him as the most colourful character on campus. But when he falls hard for a student activist, played by Katrina Bowden, he begins to question his father's true character and the course of his family's apparently inexhaustible wealth. It is expected air on the Sci-Fi Channel this fall.

Local talent agent Lesa Kirk says she has a hot one on her hands these days. Ryan Kennedy has just wrapped up a series lead on the soap operish series Whistler, which was mostly shot in the resort town.

He plays a lead role in the Spyglass/Disney feature film *The Invis*ible, now in theatres. He has had a number of other lead roles recently and has been offered the starring role in a feature film called Chasing The White Dragon which will be shot in Tupelo, Miss.
